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

When you're young nothing appears to be out of reach. If a lake requires a long hike in, then so be it. And then, as you get older, you look for a lake you can pull right up beside Chris Meadows just happens to be young and is always up for a challenge. He prefers to go to lakes that are rarely fished due to being "too much work" for most. This year he decided to tackle Smart Lake and venture even further onto a small unnamed lake off from it. Now it should be noted that to get to the boat on Smart Lake, it requires a hike of 550 steps from where you park. The good news is that it is all downhill, going in that is! Well Chris started his day carrying a forty-pound 4-horse motor and all the gear down to the shore of Smart Lake. After getting all his gear loaded into the boat, he pushed off, started the motor and went about a hundred yards before the motor died. (At this point of the story a slight disclaimer is needed... WE didn't give Chris the 4 HP motor) Although it is our motor, he borrowed it from another guest. Now had Chris got the motor directly from us, he would have been given instructions about the fuel shut off on the side of the motor which is different from the 9.9HP motors. Ironically motors need fuel to run. (Also note that Chris is an Engineer that works for GM specializing in fuel mileage certification.) Getting back to our story...once the motor died Chris did what most people would do and pulled the rope a few hundred times working up a good sweat but to no avail. At this point, had he just turned on the gas, the story would be over. But he did not! He subsequently paddled back to shore and carried the motor uphill 550 paces, back to his truck. He happened to still have the seventy-pound 9.9 HP that we originally issued him, in the truck. Determined to fish this lake, he carried it, along with the 36-pound, 6 gallon gas tank back downhill another 550 paces. After a couple pulls, the motor starts and off he goes. He fished on Smart but then headed for the stream connecting the unnamed lake and proceeded to navigate up that. Navigate might be too strong of a word considering that there were eight beaver dams he had to pull the boat over. Now after two trips carrying different motors 550 paces to the boat, crossing a lake, navigating eight beaver dams, he finally got to the lake he wanted to fish. Problem was it was now late afternoon and he was running out of time before dark. After a few casts and not being rewarded for his efforts, Chris decided to head back which again entailed eight beaver dams, crossing the lake, and carrying all his gear 550 paces UPHILL back to the truck. Meanwhile, back in camp, Angie & I noticed he hadn't returned from his excursion and with dark skies coming quick, we decided we should do a search and rescue mission. Thankfully, we met him driving out on Fleet Road South. He told us about the motor mishap and you should have seen the look on his face when we asked if he turned the gas on! Needless to say, that won't ever happen again. The good news is that a few beers beside the bonfire that night and all bruised egos were soothed. FALL GROUSE SEASON

Most of our die-hard grouse hunters know that the last two weeks of September are the perfect time to be at Gold Arrow. Whether you are walking the trails early in the morning or sitting on your favorite lake you can't beat the fall colors of late September. The sky is bluer and the smell of falling leaves in the air is unforgettable. Add in the frosty mornings and warm bonfires at night and it makes for a perfect time to be in camp. Grouse numbers this year proved to be one of the best years ever. I may be wrong, but I believe every hunter took home their limit of fifteen birds and also enjoyed eating several while in camp. We spend so much time keeping these trails open that we are thrilled to see our guests take full advantage of them during grouse season. This same time of year is also when the bull moose are rutting and many grouse hunters were able to catch a glimpse of a moose or two. Tom and Lynn love this time of year so much that they stay two straight weeks!

Historically the biggest catch of the year ends up being either a Muskie or Northern, but not always. Little did Jon Zacharias know what was in store for him this past summer when he and his dad headed off to Caribou Lake for some fishing. Not only would Jon end up with the biggest catch of the year but also the biggest catch ever documented at Gold Arrow! Most of the time the big ones are located out in the main portion of the lake off a point where there is some depth and good structure. You would be surprised however to hear that Jon's catch was accomplished right at the boat landing and he was even casting from shore. Upon beaching their boat, the guys took a load of gear up the hill to their truck. When they returned to where the boat was, they were surprised to see it was no longer there. Seems as if a wind had caught the boat and it was now some forty yards downstream. Jon thought he could either wade in after it or better yet put his college baseball skills to use. He grabbed his rod and threw a perfect strike landing his Rapala right inside the boat. With a little bit of luck, he hooked the lip of the boat which isn't an easy task from that distance. After setting the drag and playing the many runs made by the Lund, it finally tired and was reeled in to shore. So, hats off to you Jon for your quick thinking, accurate cast and the new whopping record of a 168" Lund boat catch!

GOLD ARROW GUESTS FOOT THE BILL

Hard to believe that we have had the honor of being your hosts now going on fifteen years. During this time, we have accomplished many goals for our guests. This now includes all new cabin roofs, windows, enclosed porches and new bathrooms in every cabin. In addition, we maintain all of the trails that take off from Aerobus, Fleet North, Fleet South, and Smart Road. That my friend is over twenty miles of trails to keep brushed. We also exclusively maintain Fleet North, Fleet South, and Smart Road. Did you know during our fifteen years not a single dime has been spent by any government agency to maintain those 3 roads. It has been all Gold Arrow brushing, grading, and maintaining the culverts of these roads. Had we not done the work these roads would be nothing more than ATV trails at this point. The good news is that we do the work weekly spending countless days keeping everything open. Next year all of Fleet North needs brushed which is six miles long. Guess who will be doing this work...none other than Gold Arrow Camp/Todd & Angie. Brushing both sides equates to twelve miles which all must be walked with a brush blade in hand. This is time consuming, physical work and something that many other camps take for granted. We have always felt that in an ideal world only Gold Arrow guests would be able to enjoy the trails and roads that we maintain. Wouldn't that be awesome? No more free loading taking place by other people who neither contribute financially or physically to the maintenance of these roads and trails. But just like the rest of life, those people will always exist. Maybe, if they realize it is all of you who foot the bill and us that do the work, they might at least think about where they stay in the future.

LOW WATER LEVELS

As many of you recall 2022 was the year of high water and flooded roads. Fast forward to 2023 and to say we experienced low water levels this year would be a major understatement. Typically, when we arrive at camp the end of April there is still several feet of snow left to melt in the bush. This snow melt raises the lake levels for the season. This year, upon arrival, we were surprised to find no snow and the ground already dry. One would figure that May rains would come and make up for the lack of snow melt. The rains never materialized with the area only receiving a mere quarter inch of rain from the end of April through mid-June. Needless to say, this lack of rain put us in drought conditions and a fire ban was soon enacted. Fortunately, during the summer there were no forest fires in close proximity to camp. Other portions of Canada, on the other hand, had several massive fires burning out of control which is where the smoke in the United States originated from. Several guests talked about how bad the smoke was back

home and they were extremely surprised that the air quality at Gold Arrow remained crystal clear. With the lack of precipitation, several of the favorite lakes were very difficult to access and a couple were completely inaccessible such as Gerrard and Pickerel. With the lack of fishing pressure these great lakes should be even better in 2024. We wanted to give you all a shout out for understanding about the low water levels this past summer. We were amazed that nobody complained, but instead just revised your remote lake choices. Thank you for your understanding and make sure to pray for lots of snow this winter!

In addition, we had a couple of bears shot at that were not recovered. The good news is that after exhausting the faint blood trail, those bears should have made it. We anticipate that the upcoming 2024 season should be fantastic based on the sheer number of bears seen on trail camera.



COMPLETED PROJECTS...4 YEAR PERIOD



In 2020, we had committed ourselves to purchasing 4 new Lund boats. We also completely remodeled Cabin #9's bathroom making it very functional for a 7 man cabin. The picture window was replaced in the main lodge/store front due to a rock going through the old window. We also painted all the storage sheds and replaced a few rotten beams under them.

In 2021, we continued on with remodeling our bathrooms and Cabin #10 was completed. Thankfully we received a grant to help with Covid related improvements and docks and decks fell under their guidelines. We were able to resurface all 3 docks and all 9 cabin decks. We had money left over with which we built an additional deck on Cabin #11 and also constructed 3 freestanding decks overlooking the lake. Remember the old stone steps going to the lake? Those have been replaced with very nice steps with a railing.





2022 was a very challenging year. We arrived to lots of snow which turned to flooding. Over the winter, the heavy snowfall created a lot of downed trees and hours upon hours of road and trail clearing for us. Getting this work done prior to opening along with remodeling Cabin 6 bathroom and kitchen was quite the undertaking. Work on the roads and trails continued the whole year. Cabin 9 received a much needed new beam under the front as the old was pretty rotten

In 2023 we replaced another rotten beam on Cabin #8. Our last bathroom remodel in Cabin #8 was completed. We replaced a leaky roof on the lean-to so Todd stays dry while working on motors. There is now electricity at the main dock (thank you Neal and Joe for your help and knowledge). And, finally, all 9 cabins along with the fish cleaning house, grease house and shop got a fresh coat of paint.





Each year upon arrival our guests come into the camp store to check out who is on the biggest fish leader board and the size needed to knock them off. After all, the biggest fish award comes with prestige when you think about it. First you get on the cover of the Gold Arrow newspaper, followed by the fishing magazines hounding you for interviews hoping you will pass on the tips that make you so good. Next, guys like Bill Dance and Babe Winkleman start calling you hoping to get you on their show to give them tips on how to catch the big ones. So, yeah, the biggest fish award is pretty coveted and comes with lots of perks. 
